Things were fairly typical in the King's Indian for the first 15 moves or so. Bishop takes Knight on move 17 had some multi-purposes to it. If I don't take then he could attack the d pawn with the knight and queen. Also - by taking with the pawn it forces him to close off the diagonal for the White Bishop. My queen blockades the pawn nicely, puts pressure on the dark squared diagonal, and supports the d pawn.

Things are closing up for White's dark squared bishop as well. Would love to have gotten the Knight in there and forked both rooks but that wasn't going to happen.


The queen and rook lined up on the h6 diagonal was really juicy as well. I was hoping to get the knight to the e3 square, advance the bishop to h6 and then drop the knight back to f5 - Pins the queen and rook with the knight supporting.

Pushing the pawn on move 26 was another multipurpose move. Advances the pawn and prevents the queen from checking. Originally thought he would take the c pawn and attack my Queen with the support of the rook. I was prepared to check the king with the Bishop and fork his queen at the same time. Instead, he took the d pawn with the Bishop; I took the Bishop with the Rook and thought it was a free piece since he can't afford to take with the Queen. Queen takes Rook and c4 advances with check, will take the queen and advance towards promotion.

I liked f4 at move 31 - Multipurpose move but more importantly it was opening up a file for my rook.

33.Bf8 was a bit gutsy. Thought I would pick up the Queen at the cost of a rook and bishop. Then trade down fast as I can.


