(Joe - I wanted to play 8...d5 but after 9.cxd5 Nxd5 10.Nxd5 Qxd5 11.Qc4 forces the trade of queens, and I did not like that. Stockfish 7 gives black advantage after 8...f4! If white captures on f4, then 9...Nd4 is a wonderful place for the knight. And if white plays, for example, 9.Nf3, then 9...fxe3 10.fxe3 Ng4 11.Qe2 Na5, and black is attacking all of these weak pawns.) 9.Nge2 d5 10.cxd5 Nxd5 11.0-0-0 Be6 12.d4 Ndb4?? (Joe - I was playing by intuition. I thought if I could get two pawns for the knight, and expose white's king, the sacrifice would be worth it. But it did not work out that way. 12...exd4 is best, but I rejected that because I thought it was letting white back into the game.) [Better is 12...exd4 and Black can hope to survive 13.Nxd5 Qxd5] **13.axb4** Nxb4 14.dxe5 Qe8 15.Qb1 Bxb3 16.Nd4?? [D]


(Joe - Natural, but this is almost losing. The computer says 20.Ne2.) 20...Rad8 (Joe - Now I found the right move! The idea is to take the d2 square away as a flight square for white's king.) 21.Nxe7?? [Better is 21.Qe4 would keep White in the game 21...Nd3+ 22.Kc2] 21...Qxe7 (Joe - The machine likes 21...Nd3+ first even more.) 
