[D] (Next col.) (Joe - Rybka, to my surprise, liked 15.b4 better, but I think the text is a much more direct way to attack.) [15.b4 Ng4 16.Bxg4 Bxg4 17.Qxg4 Bxc3 18.b5=] 15...g4? (Joe - I was starting to get really worried around here. My goal was (Text .cont. next col.)

(Cont. from prev.col.) to prevent Bf3. I thought that if white got Bf3 in, I was toast, because white could capture the knight on c6, the main defender of my king. The computer suggests 15...Nd5, which is better, but after 16.Nxd5 ((if white does not capture, then black has 16...Nb6)) black must play 16...Rxd5 17.Bf3 Ra5, and he should be okay.) [Better is 15...Nd5!? is a viable option 16.Bf3 Bxc3 17.bxc3 Nxc3] 16.Bxa7 [D]



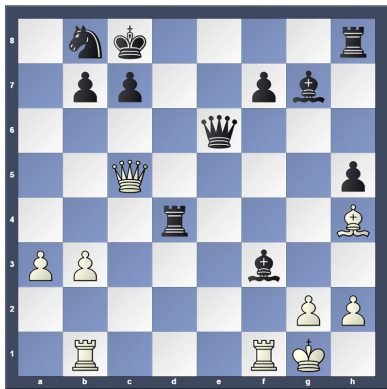
16...h5?? (Joe - This should lose. The move was designed to protect the pawn on g4, so I could move my knight on f6, more than to pawn storm the white king.) [16...Qe5!? is worth consideration] 17.Be3 Nb8? (Joe - The computer says 17...Rd5 or 17...Rd6, both of which lose an exchange. Black also must worry about 18.Qa8+ Nb8 19.Ba7, winning the knight.) [17...Rd5 18.Nxd5 Nxd5] 18.Bg5? (Joe - I am not sure what this was trying to accomplish. Still best is 18.Qa8. Rybka easily refuted my intended 18...c6 with the idea of 19...Qe5 simply with 19.Bf4! (Text cont. next col.)

(Cont. from prev.col.) After 18.Qa8, black must lose an exchange.) [18.Qa8 Qe5 19.Ba7] 18...Qe6 19.Bh4?! [Better is 19.Nc2!? Nd5 20.Nxd5 Rxd5 21.Ne3] 19...Nd5 (Joe - White's last two moves lost time and let black back into the game.) 20.Ne4 (Joe - White need to exchange knights.) [Better is 20.Nxd5 would keep White alive 20...Qxd5 21.Bd1=] 20...Nf4! 21.Bd1 Rd4? [D]

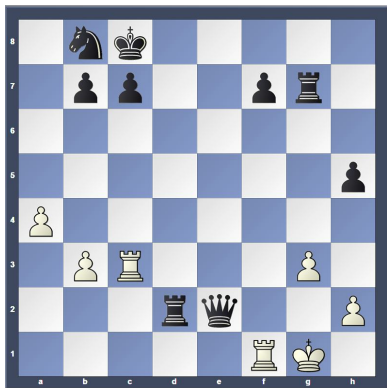


(Joe - Now its black's turn to throw away the advantage! I think I rejected the immediate 21...Nxd3 because after 22.Nxd3 Rxd3, at some point white will be able to free her position with Re1 or Bc2. I wanted to keep white's pieces bottled up.) [21...Nxd3 22.Ng5 Qg6 23.Bc2 Nxb2 24.Qb3] 22.Qc2 (Joe - Rybka says that 22.Nc5 and 23.b4 was the best way to continue.) 22...Nxd3 23.f3? [Another bit of territory lost] [23.Ng3 Bg6 24.Qc3 Be5] 23...Ne5?! (Joe - The immediate 24...gxf3 is better, but the text still wins.)
