(Eric - Joe will probably also submit this game with his notes. It's a bit of a mystery as to what black's losing move might have been. There are no glaring mistakes in the opening. Even after black loses a pawn on move 12 his position seems sound enough. By move 19 all of black's pieces are active and there are no obvious weaknesses in his position. Somewhere between moves 20 and 30 white gains an outside passed pawn and a winning endgame – all without black having made any seemingly unreasonable moves. Like I said, it's a bit of a mystery.)


