(Joe - This is slightly better than recapturing with the pawn.) 10.Ne4 Bc7 11.d4 Re8 12.Nc3? [D]

(Cont. from prev.col.) (Joe - Now black will seize the initiative.)

12...e4 13.Nxd5?? [D]



(Joe - White apparently miscalculated. 13.Nd2 was probably best.) [Better is 13.Nd2!? is noteworthy 13...Nxc3 14.Bxc3] 13...exf3 14.Bxf3 cxd5 15.Bxd5 Nf6 16.Bf3 Qd6 17.g3 Ne4 18.Rc1 Bf5 19.Bg2 Rac8 20.f3?? [D]



[White has lost his nerve... understandable when you consider his position] (Joe - This just invites black to sacrifice.) [Better is 20.Qe2]

20...Nxc3! [Discovered attack: g3, Qd6-g6] 21.hxc3 Qxc3 22.Rxc7 [D]



(Text cont. next col.)

(Cont. from prev.col.) (Joe - The computer says that this is the best move by about four pawns!)

22...Rxc7 23.e4 [23.Qe1 cannot undo what has already been done 23...Qxe1 24.Rxe1 Rc2+] 23...Bh3 24.Rf2 Re6 25.Kf1 Bxg2+ [D]



(Joe - If you want to nitpick, 25...Rg6 was stronger.) [25...Rg6 26.Qe2 Qh2 27.Qb5 Bxg2+ 28.Ke1-+] 26.Rxg2 Qh3 27.d5 [27.Kf2 the only chance to get some counterplay 27...Rec6 28.Kg1-+] 27...Rg6 [D]



(Joe - White cannot avoid mate.) [27...Rg6 28.Ke2 Rxc7+ 29.Ke3 Qh6+ 30.Kd4 Rxb2 31.Kd3 Qf6 32.Ke3 g5 33.f4 Rc3+ 34.Qd3 h5 35.f5 Qb6+ 36.Kf3 Rxd3#] 0-1

White: Terance Hall (1836)

Black: Alex MacFarlane (1863)

Date: 2/23/2018

[D20: Queen's Gambit Accepted: 3 e3 and 3 e4] **1.d4 d5 2.c4 dxc4** (Terance - Didn't expect this from Alex.)

3.Bf4 [D]



(Terance - I played this to get out of book. e3 or e4 is normally played here.) **3...Nf6**

4.Nc3 a6 (Terance - Intending to hold on to the c4 pawn.)

5.a4 (Terance - This give a slight advantage to Black. e3 should be played here and if b5 then a4, b4, and then Na2 and White has compensation for the pawn.) **5...Nc6 6.e3 [D]**



6...Na5 (Terance - Delaying development to hold on to the pawn in which I welcomed. A later Nb3 doesn't bother me as I can play around it.)

7.Nf3 Bg4 8.h3 [Stockfish 9*

NOTE: To see all the Stockfish analyses, click on the "html" link at the end of this article.]

8...Bxf3 9.Qxf3 c6 10.Be2 e6

11.Qg3?! [D] (Next col.) (Terance - Better was 0-0, or Be5. I played Qg3 to avoid trading Bishops on d6 and to put pressure on the g7 pawn to keep black from moving his Bishop out to castle.) **11...Nb3?!**

(Terance: Black loses his advantage and should start to finish his development by Bb4. By putting his Knight on b3 it forces my rook to a better square that (Text cont. next col.)

Position after 11.Qg3?! (From prev. col.)



(Cont. from prev. col.) equalizes the game.) [11...Qb6!? looks like a viable alternative.] **12.Rd1= b5**

(Terance - Best move!) **13.axb5**

(Terance - Another move was 0-0, but I played axb5 to give Black a chance to go wrong with cxb5)

[Stockfish 9*] **13...axb5 14.Bf3**

Nd5?! (Terance - Now White has a slight advantage, better was Qc8.)

[Stockfish 9*] **15.0-0 g6?** [Black should quickly conclude development.] (Terance: f6 was the move to play and then Kf7 to finish developing.)

[Better is 15...f6=] [Stockfish 9*] **16.h4?** (Terance - This not only losses the advantage but gives Black a sight one. Best was Bxd5 and White has a nice advantage.) [16.Bxd5! exd5 17.Bc7 Qc8] [Stockfish 9*]

16...h5? (Terance - With this move it gives White a huge advantage. Better is Bb4.) [Better is 16...Bb4!?? is interesting] [Stockfish 9*] **17.Be5±**

Rh7 18.Ne4 (Terance - This looses my advantage and now the game is equal. e4 was the key move to play which was a move I considered but I thought bringing in the Knight to clamp down on Black's weakened dark squares was the way to go.)

[18.e4! Nxc3 19.bxc3 Be7+] [Stockfish 9*] **18...Be7**

(Terance: Any other move seems to lose. I foresaw this move and figured I could sacrifice the h pawn for some play.) **19.Nd6+**

(Terance - Slightly better was Nc5.) [Stockfish 9*] **19...Kf8 [D]** (Next col.)

(Terance - Best move in the position which I was expecting.)

20.Be4? (Terance - Bad move why I changed my mind from e4 which was planned when I played Ne4 I don't know why.) [20.e4!? is noteworthy.

20...Nb4 21.d5 Bxh4 (Text cont. next col.)

Position after 19...Kf8 (From prev. col.)



(Cont. from prev. col.) **22.Qh2=]**

[Stockfish 9*] **20...Bxh4 21.Qf3 f5**

(Terance - I missed this move as I thought Kg8 was the move to be played to get out of the pin, but f5 is strong also.) [Stockfish 9*] **22.Bb1?**

(Terance - With this move it looks like White is losing now. Bc2 was best.) **22...Bf6**

(Terance - Rd7 would of nailed down Whites position.) [Better is 22...Rd7 23.Ne4 Kg8-+] **23.Bh2??**

[Causes further problems for White] (Terance: This losses on the spot but I was starting to get into a little time crunch and wanted to play quicker and to keep as many pieces on the board.)

[Better is 23.e4 Nxd4 24.Bxd4 Bxd4 25.Nxc4] [Stockfish 9*] **23...Rd7-+**

(Terance - The strongest winning move.) **24.e4** (Terance - I think the best move to complicate things up for any chances.) [24.Qg3 Kg7 25.Nxf5+ exf5 26.Bxf5-+] **24...Nxd4**

(Terance - I have to admit I didn't realize how strong this move was as my Queen has no good squares to go to.) **25.Rxd4 Bxd4**

26.exd5 exd5 [26...Rxd6!? keeps an even firmer grip 27.Bxd6+ Qxd6 28.Rd1 Bxb2 29.dxc6-+] **27.Bxf5**

(Terance - Nxf5 was slightly better, but I played Bxf5 which I thought gave Black more choices to go wrong.) **27...gxf5 28.Qxf5+ [D]**



(Text cont. p.3)

Cont. from p.2) (Terance - same comment as my last move, as playing the Queen would give me a chance if Black plays wrong.) [28.Nxf5 Bxb2 29.Qxh5-+] **28...Qf6??** (Terance - Yes, Black plays the wrong move and realizes it after he touches it and must play it. This losses on the spot) [Better is 28...Bf6 secures the point 29.g4 Rxd6-+] **29.Qxd7+- Rd8** [29...Kg8 does not win a prize 30.Kh1 Rf8 31.Qxc6+-; 29...Qxf2+?? [Stockfish 9*] **30.Qxc6 Be5** (Terance - At this point we both were in time pressure to make the time control.) **31.Bxe5 Qxe5** **32.Nxb5 Qxb2 33.Re1 Qg7 34.Qc5+** [Stockfish 9*] **34...Kg8 35.Re7** [Better is 35.Nd6 and White takes home the point] **35...Qg5 36.Re3 Qf6 37.Nd4** [D]



37...Kh8 38.Qc7 [38.Ne6 and White can already relax 38...Ra8+-] **38...Rf8** **39.Qg3?!** (Terance - This drops the Knight and gives Black some drawing chances.) **39...Qxd4± 40.Re7=** [Better is 40.Qg5 h4 41.Kh1 Qa1+ 42.Kh2±] **40...Rg8??** [Throws away the game][Better is 40...h4 and Black hangs on.] **41.Qf3** (Terance - This move is good but Qd6! wins on the spot.) [41.Qd6! Qa1+ 42.Kh2+-] **41...Qg4± 42.Qxd5** (Terance - The best chance.) **42...Rg5 43.Re8+ Kh7± 44.Qc6 c3** [D]



(Terance - At this point Alex offered a draw, even though g3 gives me some chances, but I had rather not risk it and accepted the draw.) $\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ (Text cont. next col.)

(Joe - Terance had many, many victims in this tournament. One of them tipped me off that he had prepared extensively for him. So I thought about some of the games that I have published in the newsletter before, and I decided to vary. I thought I had never played this move before in my life, but it turned out it was the third time that I ever played it. Terance had his first real think after it.)

8.f3 (Joe - There is nothing wrong with this, but other players have played 8.Ne2 9.f3 and 10.Nf4 to win bishop for knight.)

8...Bh5 9.Qc2 (Terance - Nge2 can be played here also.) [Stockfish 9*] *(Please click on or copy and paste the "html" link at the end of this article to see the complete unedited analyses.) **9...Bg6=**

10.Bxg6 hxg6 11.Nge2 Nbd7

12.0-0-0 a5 13.Kb1 [Stockfish 9*]

13...b5?! [D] (Next col.) (Joe - This weakens the pawn on c6, but a win guaranteed me a tie for first place, so I decided to go for it.) **14.e4** (Terance - Flank attack so I must hit in the center as I was preparing for this.) **14...b4** (Joe - The computer preferred 14...dxe4, but I had an idea in mind.) (Terance - I was expecting this move which gives me an advantage (Text cont. next col.)

(Position after 13...b5?!) (From prev. col.)



(Cont. from prev. col.) now. Better was dxe4.) [Stockfish 9*] **15.Na4 dxe4 16.fxe4 Ng4 17.Bxe7 Qxe7** (Joe - This is the position I had in mind when I played 14...b4.) **18.Qxc6?! [D]**



(Joe - White now has more pawns and more problems.) (Terance - An unwise decision, playing Rde1 was the best move. Playing Qxc6 creates complications for me to hold on to the pawn and a lot of time calculating the consequences.) [Better is 18.Rde1!? has some apparent merit.] [Stockfish 9*] (Joe - White now has more pawns and more problems.)

18...0-0 19.Rc1 (Terance - I wasted too much time here calculating all the possibilities and finding the best move.) **19...Nf2 20.Rhf1** (Terance - Here I wasted more time to check if I should push e5 and sac the exchange for Black's active Knight which I concluded was not worth it.) [20.e5?] [Stockfish 9*] **20...Nxe4 21.Qc2 [D]** (Next Col.) (Joe - The computer assesses black as being almost a pawn up, but I thought it was closer to equal, with maybe a slight advantage for black.) (Terance - Slightly better was Rfe1.) [21.Rfe1 Rac8 22.Qxc8 Rxc8 23.Rxc8+ Kh7]

21...Rac8 22.Qd3 Rfe8 (Terance - This move sets up some possible tactics.) (Text cont. next col.)

(Position after 21.Qc2) (From prev. col.)




(Cont. from prev. col.) **23.Rxc8 Rxc8 24.Rc1** (Terance - Now I have to play for a draw in a worse position.) [24.Ng1 Qe6] **24...Rxc1+mu 25.Nxc1 Nf2?! [D]**



(Joe - This looks like it throws away all of white's advantage. The computer liked the solid 25...Ndf6, but I wanted something more aggressive.) (Terance - An incorrect move which allows me to equalize the game.) [25...Ndf6!?!] [Stockfish 9*]

26.Qe2= Qf6 27.Qe8+?! (Joe - A better way to hold the balance was 27.Nc5.) (Terance: A nicer move was Nc5.) [Stockfish 9*] **27...Nf8 28.Qe5 [D]**



(Joe - Terance offered a draw. Between needing a win to tie for first, and the fact that Terance was down to about a minute a move for the (Text cont. p.5)

(Cont. from p.4) rest of the time control, I decided to keep playing.) (Terance - I was down to about a minute a move for the rest of the time control, I decided to keep playing. (Terance - Only move that keeps the balance.) **28...Qc6**
29.Nc5 [White king safety improved] (Terance - Best and only move that keeps White in the game as my active Knight and Queen compensates for the loss of the g pawn.) **29...Qxg2** **30.d5?** (Joe - Natural, but it should cost white another pawn.) (Terance - Here I played the losing move in severe time pressure, I wanted to play Qg3 but did not have enough time to calculate it out.) [Better is 30.Qg3 and White can hope to survive] ([Stockfish 9*]) **30...Ng4+** **31.Qd4 Nf6?! [D]**




(Joe - The computer says it is safe to play 31...Nxh2, but I did not want to take any chances.) (Terance - Making sure to block my d pawn on d7 if necessary.) [Better is 31...Nxh2 the advantage is on the side of Black 32.N1b3 g5-+] **32.d6 Qc6**
33.N1b3 [33.N1d3 N8d7] ([Stockfish 9*]) **33...a4** **34.Na5?** [D]


