(Joe - Taking advantage of the fact that white has not played d4 yet.) 8.cxd5 cxd5 9.Nb5 e4 (Joe - Second best, according to Stockfish 7. It prefers 9...Nc6.) **10.Nxd6 Qxd6** [White has the pair of bishops.] 11.Nd4 Nc6 [11...Bd7 12.Be2=] 12.Nb5 [D] (Next col.) (Joe -Another good idea is 12.Rc1, putting more pressure on c6.) 12...Qb8 13.f4 **Be6** (Joe - Of course not 13...exf3 esp. 14.gxf3 and there are many open lines pointing at black's king.) 14.Bxf6 qxf6 15.Qb2 Qd8 16.Nd4 Rc8 17.Be2 f5 18.h4? [D] (Next col.) (Joe - The first real mistake of the game. White should (Text cont. next col.)

(Cont. from prev.col.) simply castle. Now white gets weak isolated pawns.). [White has a new backward pawn: g2] (Alex - This move was a wild and impatient attempt to start an attack that immediately stalled.)


