Position after 35...Ra5 (From prev.col.)

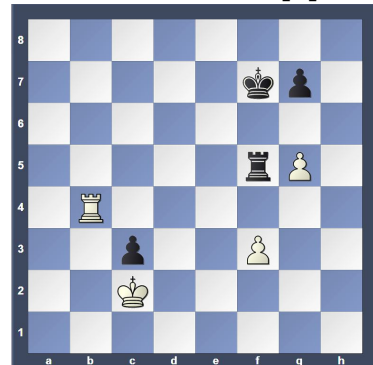

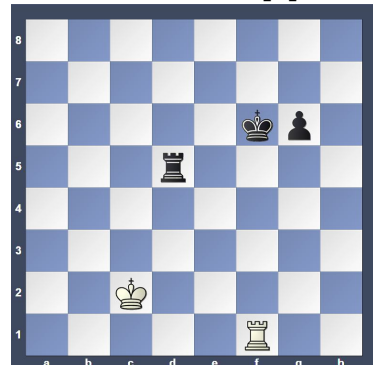

Mike wrote in an email in which he attached a "pgn" file: "I don't have the finishing moves, but all my drawing chances were gone by the end of this file." All I know is that Eric definitely won, but I do not necessarily see how from this position. This position looks drawn. It looks like White can keep Black in a perpetual check pattern. Therefore, I do not think the final position shown as I have it can be the actual final position. I conclude some of the previous few moves as recorded (at least by me) are not the actual moves made in the game. Nevertheless, I wanted to keep this game in the newsletter because up to this point it was a very interesting game.
