1.d4 d5 2.Nf3 Nf6 3.e3 [D]

(Terance: Here it seems to me that White wants to play a Colle.) 3...Bf5 [D] (Next col.) (Terance: I figured here is my chance to get my bad Bishop in play outside the pawn chain since White's c-pawn has not moved yet.) 4.c4 (Terance: I was expecting c 3 , White wants a standard Slav.) 4...e6 5.Nc3 c6 (Terance: A Slav it is!) 6.cxd5 exd5 [D] (Next col.) (Terance: I took this way as slightly better as it (Cont. next col.)

Position after 3...Bf5 (From prev. col.)


Position after 6...exd5 (From prev. col.)

(Cont. from prev. col.) gives mea Queenside pawn majority which is less "drawish" in an endgame. From here my play is to take the e-file and point my pieces toward White's Kingside.) 7.Bd3 Bxd3 [D]

(Terance: I was happy to trade off White's good Bishop and leave him with his bad penned in Bishop.)
8.Qxd3 Bd6 [D] (Next col.) (Text cont. next col.)

Position after 8...Bd6 (From prev. col.)

(Cont. from prev.col) (Terance: Natural and best move. I thought a lot on this move as I was worried about e4. e4 would force things into a "drawish" position with White having a weak d-pawn. M y candidate moves were Be7, Nbd7, and Bb4. I chose Bd6 as it helps control e5 and eyes h2.) 9.a3?! [D]

(Terance: White wants to start the thematic b-pawn attack in this Carlsbad pawn structure. Slightly better was to protect the King first with $0-0$. ) [*Stockfish: 9.0-0 0-0 10.e4 Nxe4 11.Nxe4 dxe4, etc...] 9...0-0 10.0-0 Re8 [D] (p.2) (Terance: M ust control the e-file first.) 11.b4 a6 (Terance: Played to slow down White's Queenside attack.) 12.Bb2 Nbd7 (Terance: Finished my development, now to execute my plan.) 13. Rfel (Terance: Preparing to push e4.) [*Stockfish: $13 . \mathrm{Nd} 2$ Qe7 14.Rae1 Ne4 15.Ncxe4 dxe4 16.Qc2 Nf6, etc...] 13...Ne4 [D] (p.2) (Text cont. p.2)

(Cont. from p.1) (Terance: This is the strongest move as the Knight is on a beautiful square and can't be taken with Nxe4 as dxe4 forks White's Knight and Queen.) 14. Qc2 (Terance: Played so that he can take on e4 with no fork.) 14...Ndf6 [D]

(Terance: At this time I was pretty happy with my position. Now I have to figure out the best way to launch an attack.) [*Stockfish: 14...Re6!? 15.Nxe4 dxe4 16.Ne5 Qe7 17.Nxd7 Qxd7 , etc...] 15.Na4? (Terance: I considered this move a little slow as Black's attack is coming fast.) [15.Nxe4!? should be investigated more closely 15...Nxe4 16.Ne5=+; ] [*Stockfish: 15.Ne2 Ng4 16.h3 Ngxf2 17.Rf1 Nxh3+, etc...] 15...Ng4!?-+ [D] (Next col.) (Terance: My intuition told me this is the best move with a huge, if not winning position. I just had to figure out how to follow up the attack.) (Text cont. next col.)

Position after 15...Ng4!?-+ (From prev. col.)

(Cont. from prev. col.) 16.Re2 (Terance: I felt that Rf1 was slightly better. Anthony Played this to keep an eye on the weak pawn on e3, but that does not work once Black plays Nxf2 and the Rook has to take back on f2.) [Better is16.Rf1 a5 17.h3 Ngxf2 18.Rxf2 Nxf2 19.Kxf2 axb4 20.axb4 Bxb4 21.Rd1-+;] [*Stockfish: 16.Nc5 Qc7 17.Nxe4 Bxh2+18.Kf1 dxe4 19.Ne5 Nxe5, etc...] 16...Qc7 (Terance: I knew there was a key move here but I could not find it so I settled on a move that at least would not spoil my position. Now I know that the knockout move was Nxh2! । did see this but could not calculate past 19... Re6 to make sure the move worked.) [16...Nxh2!? 17.Nxh2 Bxh2+ 18.Kxh2 Qh4+19.Kg1 Re6-+] [*Stockfish: 20.Ree1 (20.g3 Qg4 21.f3 Qxf3 22.Rf1 Qxg3+23.Rg2 Qxe3+, etc...] 17.g3 [D]

(Terance: I did not even calculate this as I felt h3 was the move and I would have to retract my Knight and figure out another plan of attack. With g3, White's squares are very weak.) [17.h3 Ngf6=] [*Stockfish: 18.Rc1 Qe7 19.Nc5 a5 20.Bc3 axb4, etc...] 17...Bxg3= [D] (Next col.) (Terance: Best was Re6, but I was (Text cont. next col.)

Position after 17...Bxg3= (From prev. col.)

(Cont. from prev. col.) a little impatient and spent a lot of time calculating the sac on g 3 then the sac on f 2 , then the Rook left on e6. I came back to the sac on g 3 as I have five pieces attacking White's King and White has a very bad Bishop on b2, a non-active Rook on al, and a Knight on the rim at a4 out of action. I also know it is hard to defend correctly when under attack. I also knew that if I missed something then it would be "drawish," so I had this confidence.) [*Stockfish: 17...Re6 18.Ne5 Bxe5 19.dxe5 (19.f3 Bxg3 20.fxe4 Bxh2+, etc...] 18.fxg3 Nxg3 19.Ne5?! [D]

(Terance: I had calculated this move and knew I would have a slight advantage if this was played. I was more concerned if White Played Ree1, I was wondering what to play after this.) [19. Ree1!? is interesting 19...Nxe3 20.Qf2=+7; [*Stockfish: If 19.hxg3 Qxg3+20.Rg2 Qxf3 21.Bc1 Rxe3, etc...] 19...Nxe2+-+ 20.Qxe2 Nxe5 (Terance: I played this to give White weak pawns and it still kept his bishop bad after I played Re6.) [*Stockfish: 20...Nh6 21.Rf1 f6 22.Nd3 Re4 23.Bc1 Rh4, etc...]
21.dxe5 Re6= (Terance: Better was a5.)
[21...a5!?-+] [*Stockfish: 22.Nc5 axb4 23.axb4 Rxa1 + 24.Bxa1 b6 25.Nd3 c5 26.bxc5 bxc5, etc...] 22.Nc5 Rg6+
23.Kf1?! [D] (p.3) (Terance: Better was Kh1 which would allow the al Rook to aid
(Position after 23.Kf1?! (From p.2)

(Cont. from p.2) in the defense. With Kf1 the Rook on al is cut off and Black can try to attack the King with no cover.) [23.Kh1 a5 24.Rf1 axb4 25.axb4 Ra2-+] 23...b6 (Terance: Again, a5 was best. I was trying to mobilize my pawn majority.) [Better is23...a5!? 24.Nd3 axb4-+] 24. Nd3=+ Qd7 [24...a5 25.Nf4 Rg5 26.Rc1=+] [*Stockfish: 24...Rg5 25.Nf4 h5 26.Nxh5 Qc8 27.Nf4 Qf5, etc..]
25. $\mathrm{Nf} 4=$ [D]

(Terance: Now White for the first time in the game seizes the initiative.) 25...Rg5 26. Rc1 (Terance: I was a little concerned with h4, but figured out I can go Rf4 and then g6 if needed.) [*Stockfish: $26 . \mathrm{h4}$ Rf5 27.Kg2 g6 28.Rf1 c5 29.Kg3 Re8, etc...] 26...Qf5!? (Terance: This was a key move for me as I had to take advantage of the light squares. I said to myself, "Where is the best place for my Queen?" I saw Qe4 with mate threats hard to meet. I also knew that the c6 pawn was hanging, but White has no time to take it as it would be dangerous. I also knew that White might miss my not so obvious Qf5 to Qe4 maneuver.) [26...h5 27.Qc2 Rc8 28.Qd1=+] 27.Rxc6?! (Terance: Anthony mentioned after the game that he didn't see Qe4 but was looking at direct threats which were all covered to him.)
[*Stockfish: 27.Kf2 a5 28.b5 cxb5 29.Qc2 Qg4 30.h3 Qg3+31.Ke2 h6, etc...] (Text cont. next col.)
(Cont. from prev.col.) 27...Qe4 (Terance: Now I had to make sure this move still worked as White is also threatening Qxa6 playing on my back rank weakness. I also knew that White's best defense was Ng 2 and I was trying to figure out what to play if White plays this.) 28.Qc2?? [D]

(Terance: This move threatens a back rank mate and my Queen, but leaves his King un-protected. So this was the losing move!) [Better is28.Ng2= would hold out] [*Stockfish: 28...h5 29.Qc2 Qf3+30.Qf2 Qd1+31.Ne1 Qg4, etc...] 28...Qf3+-+ 29.Ke1 Qxe3+ [D]

(Terance: White resigns as it is a mate in one!) [29...Qxe3+30.Qe2 Rg1\#] 0-1

[12...c4 13.Bf5=g6, Stockfish BM I2: 14.Bxg6 fxg6 15.Qxg6+Kh8 16.Nf4 Nh7, etc...] 13.Bg3+= (Terance: Of course Bg3 is positionally best, as now I control the dark squares and Black has lost a tempo as the Knight on d7 is misplaced which has to go back to f6 to get back in play.) 13...cxd4

(Cont. from prev. col.) [White has a very active position] (Terance: Of course Bf5 was best which I saw, but I saw some tactical ideas on the Queenside also related to an up and coming Bf5 and decided on trying that. My tactical move Qa4 was based on the misplaced Knight on d7 and the hanging pawn on d5.) [15.Bf5 Ba6 16.Qa4 Bc4+=, Stockfish BM I2: 15.Bh7+Kh8 16.Bf5 Ba6 17.Qa4 Bc4 18.b3 b5, etc...]
