Nf6 5.d3 (Terance: I personally think that d4 gives White a better game.)
5...Nc6 6. Bg5 Be7 7.0-0 (Terance: A model game for White as he finishes development.) 7...h6 [D]

(Terance: Checking on White's intentions with his Bishop.) 8.Bh4 a6 (Terance: I was thinking on g5 but I was in a mood of just playing solid.) (Text cont. next col.)
(Cont. from prev. col.) 9.a4 (Terance: Preventing b5.] 9...0-0N
10.Qe2?! (Terance: Ken thought awhile on this move I guess he was trying to formulate a plan. I suggested after the game that h3 or Rfe1 was reasonable. Ken mentioned Nd2 with $f 4$ as a plan. There were better moves than Qe2 as now White must watch the d4 square.) (*Stockfish: 10.h3 b6 11.d4 cxd4 12.Nxd4 Bb7 13.Nxc6 Bxc6 14.Qd3 Nxe4, etc...] 10...Qc7 (Terance: Played to prevent e5 while still protecting e7.) (*Stockfish: 10...g5 11.Bg3 Nh5 12. Bb3 Kg7 13.Nd2 Nxg3 14.fxg3 Bd7, etc...] 11.Bg3?! (Terance: To me this was White's first bad move as it allows my next move with advantage. At first it looks good as it eyes d6 and my Queen, but I get to remove it with my next move and the dark squares become a little weak.) (*Stockfish: 11.Rfel b6 12.Nd1 Bb7 13.Ne3 Nh5 14.Ba2 Bf6, etc...] 11...Nh5 (Terance: The best move to gain the initiative and advantage.) 12. Nd2? [D]

(Terance: This move allows my Knight into d4 with threats.) [12.Bh4 g5 13. $\mathrm{Bg} 3 \mathrm{Bf} 6=+\mathrm{l}$ 12...Nxg3-+ 13.hxg3 Nd4 (Terance: Bf6 or Bd7 was playable also.) 14.Qd1 b6 (Terance: Much stronger was Bf6, but I wanted to finish my development and wanted my white squared Bishop to go to d7 or b7, so I chose b6.) (*Stockfish: 14...Bf6 15.Nf3 Nc6 16.Nh2 Bd7 17.Ng4 Bd4 18.Qd2 Rfe8, etc...] 15. Ne2 Bb7 (Text cont. next col.)
(Cont. from prev.col) (Terance: I anticipated this might happen so I figured I can continue with my plan.) [15....Nc6 16.c3-+] 16.c3 Nxe2+ (Terance: M ost practical and clear way of playing as b5 is also possible.) 17.Qxe2 d5 [D]

[Black threatens to win material: d5xc4] (Terance: Time for the break to let my Bishops shine.) 18. Bb3 dxe4 (Terance: Trying to open up a file for a Rook and more scope for my Bishop while trying to create some weakness for White.) (*Stockfish: 18...Rad8 19.Nf3 c4 20.Bc2 dxe4 21.dxe4 b5, etc...] 19.dxe4 (Terance: Better than Nxe4 as this leaves a weak pawn on d3.) 19...Qc6 [D]

(Terance: This seems like a cheapo move eyeing g 2 for a possible mate if White plays e5. I wanted to prevent White from consolidating with e5 and $f 4$ on the Kingside. This will give me time to restrict White on the Queenside and make my dark squared Bishop more active. Qc6 also supports (Text cont. p.2)
(Cont. from p.1) my planned b5 move.) (*Stockfish: 19....ffd8 20.Nf3 b5 21.e5 c4 22.Bc2 b4 23.Be4 Bxe4 24.Qxe4 Rab8, etc...] 20.f3 b5 (Terance: c5 was stronger but I did not have the time to calculate if the temporary pawn sacrifice worked but my intuition at least gave me an indication that it was possible.) (*Stockfish: 20...c4 21.Nxc4 b5 22.Ne3 Qc5 23.Bc2 bxa4 24.f4 Rfd8, etc...] 21.e5 c4 [This push gains space]

(Terance: An unfortunate move in which Ken realized it was a mistake as soon as he touched the pawn, but it was then too late and had to be played.) [Better is $22 . \mathrm{Bc} 2=+$ was a good chance to save the game; Stockfish 27021964 BM I2: 22...Rad8 23.axb5 axb5 24.Kh2 Qc5 25.f4 Rd7 26.Nf3 Bxf3, etc...] 22...Qb6+-+ [D]

(Terance: The best square between c5 and b6. Now the b3 Bishop falls.) 23.Kh1 cxb3 24.bxa6 (Terance: Ken seemed a little frustrated here after playing this move.) [24.Nxb3 does not solve anything 24...axb5 25.Nd2 Bd5-+] 24...Bxa6 [D] (Next col.) (Terance: Now I know I am clearly winning now, but now I have to play correctly for it.) 25.c4 Rfd8 26.Rac1 [26.Rfd1 is not much help 26...Rd4-+] 26...Rac8 (Terance: Here I did see Rd4, but thought White will pin me with his Queen. If I looked a little deeper, I would have seen that the pin from White's Queen would not work due to Bc4 and Rh4+ depending on where the Queen would go.)
