## Games from the NPCC 2019 Winter Robin Tournament: Round: 5

Submitted by Terance with his comments (as edited) and selected Fritz/*Stockfish comments [shown thusly].
White: Terance Hall (1870)
Black: Dennis Baluk (1917)
Date: 2/1/2019
[B23: Closed Sicilian: Lines without g3] 1.e4 (Terance: Yes, I played e4 again and only against Dennis. I only played this again as I enjoyed our last game where I sac a pawn and got a nice winning position.) 1...c5 (Terance: Sticking to his Sicilian.) 2. Nc3 (Terance: A closed Sicilian!) 2...Nc6 3.f4 [D]

(Terance: A Grand Prix attack that I had prepared for Dennis. Not quite my style, but I wanted to see how he would handle it as he misplayed it against Jacob Lee recently and lost.) 3...e6 4.Bc4?! [D] (Next col.) (Terance: The correct move here is Nf3 which I knew, but I wanted to prevent d5. I figured that Bc 4 is played after (Text cont. next col.)

Position after 4.Bc4?!(From prev. col.)

(Cont. from prev. col.) Nf3 anyway, but Nf3 discourages d5 as White can play Bb 5 with good play.) [Stockfish BMI2: 4.Nf3 d5 5.Bb5 Nge7 (5...d4 6.Ne2 Nge7 7.a4 a6 8.Bc4 Na5 9.Ba2 d3, etc...] 4...a6 5.a4 (Terance: Stopping any Queenside expansion by Black. Yes, I give up the b4 square, but even if a Knight is there, I can play around it, as it does not hinder my play, which I learned from experience.) 5...Bd6 (Terance: Dennis thought a long time on this move and decides to play for a trick tactic in my opinion. When I see moves like this, I look for the tactic and how to punish it. The move does not look right. The two tactics that I saw was with e5? Then Bxe5 fxe5 and Qh4+ picks up the Bishop on c4, if I play g3 Bxf4 gxf4 then Qh4+ with compensation.) 6.d3 (Terance: Best move that protects the c4 Bish$o p$ and $f 4$ pawn, and it is a developing move. Now Black has to waste a move to put his Bishop on a better square.) 6...Qh4+?! [D](Next col.) (Terance: Not such a good move as it wastes time for Black as the Queen has to retreat and White gains a tempo with the forcing move g3. Black can't take advantage of the g3 weakness for the loss tempo.) 7.g3 Qd8 8.Nf3 (Terance: Best and most solid move. I thought about playing Qg4 hitting the hanging g7 pawn, and after Nf6 playing Qh3 leaving (Text cont. next col.)

Position after 6...Qh4+?! (From prev. col.)

(Cont. from prev.col) the threat of e5 forking two pieces. I would not take the g7 pawn, as Rg8 would give Black too much play.) 8...h5?! (Terance: Somewhat surprising, as Black needs to develop. Black is planning to crack open White's position with h4.) [Stockfish BMI2: 8....Nge7 9.Be3 0-0 10.Qe2 b6 11.e5 Bc7 12.d4 cxd4, etc...] 9.0-0 [D]

(Terance: Best as White is ready to mobilize my pawns and pieces. White is also not afraid of the h5 pawn as this can be parried.) 9...Be7 (Terance: Black has to waste a move to put his Bishop on a better square and unblock his d pawn. He is also eyeing the h4 square.) 10.Be3 [Stockfish BM I2: 10.f5 d6 11.fxe6 Bxe6 12.Nd5 Nf6 13.Bg5 Nxd5, etc...] 10...Nh6 [Black is behind in development.] [Stockfish BM I2: 10...Nf6 11.e5 Ng4 12.Bd2 b6 13.Ne4 Nh6, etc...] 11.h3 [Stockfish BMI2: 11.Bb3 Na5 12.Ba2 Nc6 (Text cont. p.2)
(Cont. from p.1) $13 . f 5 \mathrm{Ng} 414 . \mathrm{Bd} 2 \mathrm{~h} 4$ 15.h3 Nge5, etc...] 11...Rb8? ( Terance: This seems like a waiting move to me as the b5 break is not possible now. d 5 seems like a better way to respond to White initiative.)
12. Ng5 (Terance: I played this to put a little pressure on Black knowing I gave up the d4 square temporally. So I threaten the h5 pawn and Black does not want to exchange his Bishop for my Knight, as it will open up the f-file to my advantage.) 12...g6
13.Qd2 (Terance: Now I threaten to push f5 with a hidden threat on the Knight on h6.)
13... Qc7 (Terance: Eyeing the g3 pawn with check if I push f5.) 14.Kg2+- f5 (Terance: A necessary move to stop my threats on the Kingside.)15.Qf2 (Terance: I played this to pose a threat to the c5 pawn, to control d4, and clear the way for the Rooks to push the d and e pawns. According to Stockfish, a5 keeps a nice advantage.) [Stockfish BMI2: Better is 15.a5 Nf7 16.Ba2 b5 17.axb6 Qxb6 18.Na4 Qa5, etc...] 15...b6= 16.Nf3 [D]

(Terance: I played this to aid in pushing the d-pawn to open the center with Black's King in the center, so this is my plan.) 16...Na5 [White has an active position] 17.Ba2 (Terance: Keeping the pressure on the a2g8 diagonal.) 17...Bf6 (Terance: The Bishop is now on a better square but also inviting White to play e5 To close up the position to protect his King which is the lesser evil then opening up the position.) 18. Rfel (Terance: Playing offensive and defensive as I see Bb 7 coming so planning to protect the e4 pawn and lining up against the King on e8.) 18...Bb7 (Terance: A good move to threaten White's King on g2.) 19. Bd2 (Terance: Nd5 is playable but I calculated that it leads to no advantage that I could gain. I played Bd2 to threaten to open the e-file while protecting the Knight on c3.) [Stockfish 08021964 BMI2: 19.Nd5=exd5 20.exd5 Kf8 21.b4 Ng4 22.hxg4 hxg4 23.Nh4 cxb4, etc...] 19...Kd8 [Black loses the right to castle] (Text cont. next col.)
(Cont. from prev. col.) (Terance: Better is Nc6 or 0-0. Dennis stated that with this move he was planning to mate White on the Kingside, but I had other plans.) [19...Nc6 20.Be3=] 20.Kf1 (Terance: Right idea but a better square was Kh2. Strongest was Rad1.) [Stockfish 08021964 BM I2: 20.Rad1 Kc8 21.Kg1 Nc6 22.Be3, etc...] 20...Nc6 (Terance: The Knight is needed back to help defend.) 21.Be3 = (Terance: Now I feel my position is good. I am ready to move the Rook on al over. I was not worried about Bxc 3 as that helps me having a pawn on c3 to help d4 and keeps Black from b4 and d4.) [Stockfish 08021964 BM I2: 21.Ng5 Nd4 22.Be3 Ke7 23.Nd5+exd5 24.exd5 Kf8, etc...] 21...Bc8? [D]

(Terance: Stockfish considers this a bad move ((blunder)) I did not like this move for Black, but I understood it. Black is threatening to push his d, e, and $f$ pawns and play Bxh3 with check. The problem is that Black's King is semi-trapped, and White is about to open up the position.) [21...Nf7 22.Rad1 Kc8 23.Kg2=] 22.Kg2 (Terance: Stronger is Rad1.) [22.Rad1 Ke8+] 22...Rg8? (Terance: Here I see no breakthrough in Black's favor as Black fails to see the danger in the center.) [22...Bb7 23.Rad1 Kc8 24.Rd2 $==$ 23. Rad1 (Terance: Now my position is complete and ready to push the d-pawn and open up the position.) 23...Ke8+= (Terance: Now Black realizes the danger and takes action which is a little late.) 24.d4 (Terance: Now I am ready to open things up! Stronger were Nd4, and 25 as the best) [Stockfish BM I2: 24.Nd5 exd5 25.exd5 Ne7 26.a5 bxa5 27.Bxc5 d6, etc...] (Text cont. next col.)
(Cont. from prev. col.) 24...Nb4 [24...cxd4 25.Nxd4 h4 26.gxh4 Nxd4 27.Bxd4 Bxd4 28.Rxd4 fxe4 29.Nxe4+= 25.Bb1 (Terance: The best way to hold the advantage. The Bishop is not needed now and can come to life later when the c3 Knight moves and I can play c3.) (Terance: White is winning now!) [Better is 28...Qxd6!? 29.dxe6 Qc6+] 29.dxe6+[Stockfish BMI2: 29.a5 b5 30.dxe6 Be7 31.Na2 Nxa2 32.Bxa2 b4, etc...] 29...Bxe6 [29...Bb7 30.Kh2+] 30.Ng5 [D]

(Terance: This is the position that I had in my mind when I played e5 to put pressure on the e6 square with tempo and see where Black will put the Bishop. a5 was strongest but both are winning.) [30.a5!? and White can already (Text cont. p.3)
(Cont. from p.2) relax 30...Be7 31.axb6 Qc6+] 30...Bc8 (Terance: Now the Bishop blocks the Rook from coming over to help defend on the $d$ and e files.) [Better is 30 ...Bf7 31.a5 Be7 32.axb6 Qxb6+-] 31.Qd2?!+-[D]

[Weakening the position.] (Terance: I played this knowing that Black only had about a minute left to make the time control and has to respond to threats on the board. According to Stockfish, just by moving my king to a safer square or a5 is winning by six to seven pawns on the point scale.) [Better is $31 . a 5$ Be7 $32 . a x b 6$ Qxb6 33.Na4 Qc6+34.Kh2+; Stockfish 29011964 BM I2: 31.Kh2 Be7 32.Ba2 Kg7 33.Bxg8 Kxg8 34.a5 Qc6, etc...]
31...Bb7+?? (Terance: With about a minute on his clock, Black further blunders by giving me the e6 fork square and the d6 exchange with check. Be7 would put up a little fight, but I was planning Ba2 and then Nd5 letting Black have my a2 Bishop for the huge winning attack.) [Better is 31...Be7+; Stockfish 29011964 BM I2: 32.Ba2 Nxa2 33.Nd5 Qc6 34.Kh2 Bxg5, etc...] 32.Kg1+- Qc8 (Terance: Played with about 10 seconds left.) [32...Bc8 a last effort to resist the inevitable 33.Qxd6+Qxd6 34.Rxd6 Kg7+] 33.Qxd6+ Kg7 34.Qe7+ Kh8 35.Qh7\# [D]
