(Cont. from prev. col.) which was more defensive.) 19.Rac1 Qe6 (Terance: Better was Re6 as Qe6 is a little slow. I was trying to find a plan to get my pieces over to the Kingside to attack.) [*Stockfish: 19...Re6 20.Ne2 h5 21.h3 h4 22.Rd2 Rg6 23.Kh2 b6, etc...] 20.Rd2 Qg6 [D]

(Terance: I knew the best move was to take the Knight, but I gambled by playing Stan's clock time putting pressure on his King that a mistake could happen. I also thought, hopefully, that I could bail out, if need be, to a slightly inferior game.) [Better is 27...Bxe2 and Black has air to breath 28.Rxe2 b6=Stockfish 15051964 BM I2: 29.Qd1 c5 30.Rd2 cxd4 31.Rxc8 Rxc8 32.Rxd4 Qe7, etc..] (Text cont. next col.)
(Cont. from prev. col.) 28.Nf4+[White intends d5] (Terance: Only move and winning according to the engines by looking twenty plus moves ahead, but we are human, finding certain moves are difficult, especially in time pressure.) 28...b6 (Terance: I spent a lot of time on this correct move. I found this move by eliminating every other move. I was trying to figure out how I can get a Rook over to the g-file while defending the Queenside pawns, not trying to hang the c8 Rook.) 29. Rdc2 (Terance: Stan is playing all the best moves so far.) 29...Re6 (Terance: I now realize that this was one move behind and should play Bxg2 slowly losing with correct play. I found Re6 to be the most stubborn move, hoping to gain time to play Rg6 with a possible win.) [29...Bxg2 30.Nxg2
Re6+-] 30.d5?! [D]

(Terance: I at first thought this was the critical move for me as if I play Rg6 White just plays Rxc6 and I am out of moves. The more I looked at this I realize that White could have played his king to the side and I have no good moves. After the game Dennis Baluk suggested Rc5 which leads to a draw ((see analysis)).) [Better is 30.Kh2 finishes off the opponent 30...Rh6 (Stockfish: 30...Rd6 31.gxf3 exf3 32.Rg1 Qe7 33.Rcc1 Rcd8 34.Rg4 Kh7, etc...] 30...Rf6= [D]

(Cont. from prev. col.) (Terance: I was forced to find this saving move as Rg6 does not work, because of Rxc6 and I cannot avoid the Rook exchange or other means to stop the attack. Now I threaten to remove the Knight with a mating attack.) 31.Kf1?? [D]

(Terance: This is the losing move, White had to play Kh2 so to bring the Rook over to protect g2.) [Better is 31.Kh2 this is the best way to fight back 31...Rxf4 32.Rg1=+] 31...Rxf4-+ (Terance: This had to be played. I didn't have to think about it as I was too far in to turn back! I felt that I had a winning attack if I played correctly.) 32. gxf3 (Terance: Best choice for the situation.) 32...exf3 [D]


Terance: Best and stronger than Rxf3 as the pawn restricts, creating a somewhat mating net around the White King.) 33.Kel [33.Qd3 what else? 33...Rf5 34.Rxc6-+] 33...Qg1+ (Terance: Rf5 does the trick also.)
