[A56: Czech Benoni] 1.d4 Nf6 2.c4 c5 3.d5 e5 [D] (Next col.) (Terance: I figured Dennis might play this so I just played solid lines and play for the $f 4$ and b4 break lines. White has more space but have to be careful not to trade off his good dark square Bishop. (Text cont. next col.)

Position after 3...e5 (From prev. col.)

(Cont. from prev. col.) The Knights become important in these closed positions.) 4. Nc3 d6 5.e4 Be7 6.Bd3 [D]

(Terance: Why here and not Be2? (Text cont. next col.)
(Cont. from prev. col.) Because in this plan my Knight on the g-file is going to the e2 square to support the f4 break, push and then the possible e5 break will free my Bishop on d3 with force.) 6...0-0 7.Nge2 Ne8 [D]

(Terance: This surprised me slightly but I understand it. Nh5 was preferred by the engine.) [ $*$ Stockfish: 7...Nh5 8.Qc2 Na6 9.a3 Nc7 10.b4 b6 11.Ng3 Nxg3 12.hxg3 Bd7, etc...] 8.0-0 Na6N 9.f4 [D] (p.2) (Terance: I saw no reason not to play this.) [*Stockfish: 9.b3 Bg5 10.a3 Bxc1 11.Qxc1 Bd7 12.Qd2 b6 13.Nd1 Qe7, etc...] 9...Bf6 10.Be3 (Terance: my other moves where f5 and Kh1, so I figured that I would develop my Bishop to my weak dark square and see Blacks intentions.) [D06: Queen's Gambit: Symmetrical and Baltic Defenses] 1.d4 (Terance: In this game I started with a nice positional game where I cramped Black's position. I then made a bad move losing most of my advantage, started to play poorly, was lost in a number of endgame positions, and ended up drawing the game. Mike played well enough taking advantage of my mistakes until the end missing also some chances.)
1...Nf6 2.c4 d5 3.cxd5 Nxd5 4.e4 [D]

(Terance: This gives me the center and allows me good piece play.) 4...Nb6 5. Nf3 (Terance: Played to prevent e5.) 5...e6 6.Nc3 Be7 7.a4 [D]

(Terance: I played this instead of the better move, Be3, just to play a different game, trying to be a little aggressive. (Text cont. next col.)
(Cont. from prev. col.) In hindsight, it did cost me some time tempi.) [*Stockfish: 7.Be3 0-0 8.Be2 Nc6 9.0-0 f5 10.exf5 exf5 11.Qb3+Kh8 12.d5 Nb8, etc...] 7...0-0 8.Be3N (Terance: Should of follow through with my plan, stop playing indecisive, and play a5.) 8...Nc6?! [D]

(Terance: Better was c5.) [*Stockfish: 8....5 9.a5 N6d7 10.d5 exd5 11.exd5 Nf6 12.Ne5 Bd6 13.Nc4 Na6 14.Be2 Bf5, etc...] 9.Be2 Na5 10.0-0 Nac4 11. Bc 1!? (Terance: I thought a while on this move to see if Bf 4 or BCl was best. Bf4 was interesting as Black can't take the pawn. His Knight looks to be somewhat trapped. Bc1 threatens both knights by a5 as one Knight drops. Black has to waste another move relocating the Knight. Bc1 also protects a3 after b3 so this is the stronger of the two moves. A long think on Stockfish confirms this.)
11...Nd6?! [D]

(Terance: Na5 was best. With Nd6 White has a huge advantage.) 12.Qc2 (Terance: Playing this move was good but playing a5 first was even better..) [12.a5 Nd7+] 12...a5+= [D] (p.6) (Terance: This had to be played now as if White gets a5 in Black would almost be shut down.) 13. Bf4 (Terance: Much better was Bd3 and it's hard to stop White from gaining a pawn plus (Text cont. p.6)
(Position after 12...a5+= (From p.5)

(Cont. from p.5) advantage.) [*Stockfish: 13.Bd3 Kh8 14.Rd1 f5 15.Ne5 Nd7 16.Qe2 fxe4 17.Nxe4 Nf5 18.Nf3 Nf6, etc...] 13...Nd7? [D]

(Terance: This gives White a more than a two-pawn advantage. Best was f5. This shows how cramped Black is when $f 5$ is suggested in this position. I also felt that f5 was the only choice when evaluating this position during the game.) [13...f5 14.exf5 Nxf5 15.Rfd1+=] 14.Rfd1 Qe8 [14...c6 15.d5 exd5 16.exd5+]

(Terance: This deserves a "?" but it does not ruin my game losing my winning advantage. e5, Bd3, and d5 should all be winning. I had calculated already that Bd6 does not work back on move \#13. Somehow I forgot in that moment and played it realizing I miscalculated right after I played it.) [Better is 15.e5!? Nf5 16.Nb5+- (Stockfish: 16.Bd3 Bd8 17.g4 Ne7 18.Bxh7+Kh8 19.Be4 f5, etc...]
(Cont. from prev. col.)
15...cxd6+= [Black has the pair of bishops] 16.Nb5 (Terance: By now I kind of lost my confidence in my play and was a little frustrated at myself which showed in my play from here on. e5 was slightly better.)
