[D00:1 d4 d5: Unusual lines] 1. d4 d5 (Terance: Here I forgot to play Nf6 first as Bill likes to play the Trompowsky attack with Bg5. I normally respond Ne4. I messed up the move order ☺) 2. Bg5 Nf6 [D] (Next col.) (Terance: Trying to transpose into normal lines, knowing that Bill can take on f6.) [\*Stockfish: 2...f6 3.Bf4 c5 4.e3 Nc6 5.Bb5 e6 6.Ne2 cxd4 7.exd4 Nge7 8.c4 a6 9.Bxc6+ Nxc6, etc...] 3. Bxf6 exf6 [D] (Next col.) (Text cont. next col.)

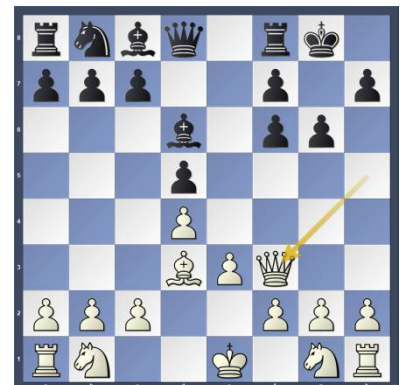

(Cont. from prev. col.) “drawable” in a lot of lines.) 4. e3 Bd6 (Terance: I thought about Bf5 to oppose White’s Bishop if he plays Bd3; but I figured I should develop by playing f5 then attack.) 5. Bd3 0-0 (Terance: I purposely played this, baiting Bill into playing Qh5 which is tempting as it seems that White might win a pawn or some pressure. The fact is that White’s best plan was to simply develop.) 6. Qh5 g6 (Terance: f5 is also playable; but g6 is best. With Qxd5 the d5 pawn is poisoned because of Bb4+ and the White Queen hangs on d5.) 7. Qf3N [D]



7...f5 8. Ne2 [\*Stockfish: 8.h4 c6 9.h5 Nd7 10.Nd2 Nf6 11.hxg6 fxg6 12.Ne2 Qe7 13.g3 b5, etc...] 8...Nd7?! [D] (p.2) (Terance: Oops I was thinking (Text cont. p.2)

(Cont. from prev. col.) (Terance: Here I thought for a while which would be the best approach after dropping the pawn. I can play aggressively with Be6 or b6, continue to develop quietly, or take a chance at complicating the position with a Kingside attack hoping White will make a mistake from the pressure and tactics. So I took the chance with a line I calculated with this Ng4 move knowing if White played accurately I would be Just a pawn down with a little pressure.) 11.h3 Qh4 [D]



(Terance: The key move, how will White respond?) 12.Ng3?? [Ruins a very nice position] (Terance: This is a blunder and loses the game due to tactics. (Text cont. next col.)

(Cont. from prev. col.) g3 was the best move in which I was going to play Qh6. If White castles, I win my pawn back with Nxe3. I understand why White chose Ng3 as he did not want to weaken his Kingside with g3 and Ng3 looks like the solution at first but fails tactically.) [Better is 12.g3 the only rescuing move 12...Qh6 13.Nbc3+= \*Stockfish: 13...c6 14.Bc4 Nf6 (14...a5) 15.a4 b6 16.h4 Bd7 17.d5 Be5 18.Rd1 c5, etc...] 12...Nxf2!+- [D]



(Terance: Best out of 3 winning choices in order: 1. Nxf2, 2. Bxg3, and 3. Nxe3.)

13.Rf1 [13.Kxf2 Qxg3+ Remove defender] 13...Bxg3 14.Nd2 Nxd3+ [D] (p.3) (Terance: Now I am trying to play moves that will prompt White to resign so I played Nxe3+ but (Text cont. p.3)

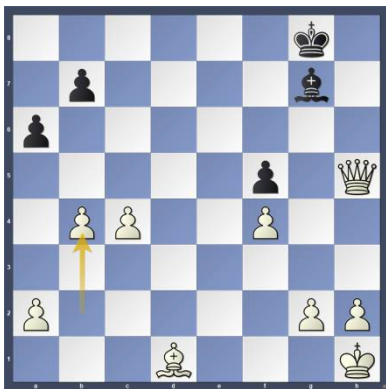

**2.c4 g6** (Terance: Ed does not go into his Knight tango variation where he plays Nc6 and Nf6 out together. He mentioned after the game that he was not prepared to play me and was thinking I might be prepared against his tango so he played the KID.)

[A28: English Opening: Four Knights Variation] 1.c4 e5 2.Nc3 Nc6 3.Nf3 Nf6 4.e3 [D]



(Terance: Dennis sticks to his trusty English opening.) 4...Bb4 5.Qc2 Bxc3 [D]



(Terance: This is the variation that I like to play. Black takes out the c3 Knight to control the center and for piece play.) 6.Qxc3 Qe7 7.a3 [\*Stockfish: 7.b3 0-0 8.Bb2 Re8 9.a3 e4 10.Nd4 Ne5 11.Nf5 Qe6 12.Ng3 b6, etc...] 7...0-0 (Terance: a5 is also playable here to prevent b5, but I choose the quick development route to strike in the center if Black plays b4.) 8.d3 d5 [D] (p.7) (Terance: Now that my King is safe I wanted to start opening the center for the initiative. (Text cont.p.7)

(Terance: I was trying to play proactively rather than reactively. I wanted to stop any activity that White's black squared Bishop might have after going to b2.) **13.0-0 Qf7** (Terance: I did not like this move but it seemed the most natural x-raying b3 and the only plan I could see putting pressure on White.) [\*Stockfish: 13...Rad8 14.Bb2 Qf7 15.Nd2 Nde7 16.h3 Bd5 17.Kh2 Nf5 18.Rac1 Qg6, etc...] **14.Nd2 [D]** (Next col.) (Text cont. next col.)

(Position after 14.Nd2 (From prev. col.)



(Cont. from prev. col.) (Terance: This was an interesting move as White chooses an active plan, moving his Knight to e4, and then c5.) **14...Qg6** (Terance: Rad8 was good also.) 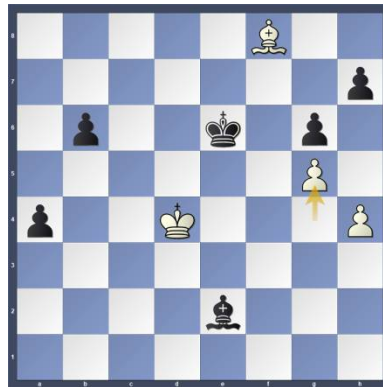

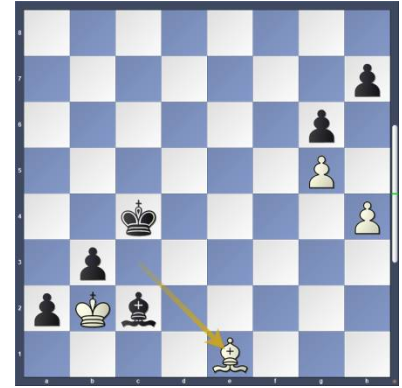
