(Joe - On February 27, I made a trip to Connecticut to play against a special opponent. ((Sadly, it was on this very trip that I also came down with diverticulitis which caused me to be hospitalized the very next day!)) You may not recognize my opponent's name, but he made national headlines two years ago simply as "Tani" (*Text cont. next col.*) (Cont. from prev. col.) the homeless boy who won the New York State Primary Championship. (Joe - I can't believe that I made this mistake. I rarely play this line ((the last time was 3 years ago)). White can gain an advantage with 7.Qb3 Nc6 8.Qxb7 and there's nothing back to do to get compensation for the pawn.) **7.Bc4** [And now Qb3 would win.] **7...e6 8.h3 Bh5 9.0-0** [White is slightly better.] **9...Nc6** [Threatening ...Bxf3.] **10.Be3 Be7 11.Nc3 0-0 12.Ne4N [D]** (Next col.) (Joe - Recently, I returned to the Rochester Chess Center¹, where I played in one event last year. Attendance has generally been growing there recently, as winter and ((hopefully)) COVID have been ending. After a 7-Player Scholastic Tournament in the morning ((which ended in a three-way tie between Vedh Ramesh, Jordan Esterman, and Ishaan Ramesh)), the Main Event began at 2:00 PM. There was a total of 22 players, which were divided into an Open and U1650 Section. 2400+ rated Lev Paciorkowski won the Open Section 3-0 ((I played him last time and gave him a good game until I lost)), and Langston Woods won the U1650.
