We traded Queens in the late opening / early middlegame, and I had to really grind him down in order to win. If I were playing a Master, I would not mind trading Queens, and I would play 11...Bb7 here. But I was not looking for another grind in this game, so I avoided the Queen trade. (Joe - Probably the first detectable error that White has made. (Joe - Another small error, giving up control of d5 and e4. 18.Nd4 would have been better.) 18...Bd5 [D]



(Joe - "What did your opponent's move allow you to do?" It allowed me to improve my Bishop. The computer, though, preferred 18...Ne4 or 18...Rad8.)


