There were two sections: an Open (which is very strong because FIDE norms are possible) and an Expert Section, which is really for U2200 players. There were 7 prizes up for grabs, from $\$ 2,000$ down to $\$ 200$, and only 17 players entered. Compare that to the U2200 section of the World Open, where there were 10 prizes available, from $\$ 12,000$ down to $\$ 400$, but, at the time of this writing, a whopping 183 players entered that section! So, the odds of winning a prize were must better in the International, so I decided to play there. The tournament was extremely competitive, with all of the players losing at least one game."
