



(Terance: Played to keep the position open as I didn't want a closed position game with c5. In hindsight c5 would allow me to play bd6 and Black can't castle.) [White should play 9.c5+- Bxe5 10.Bxe5] 9...0-0 [9...dxc4= 10.Qxc4 Nbd7] 10.e3 [10.c5+= Bxe5 11.Bxe5] 10...Qe7?! (Terance: Black didn't like his Queen lined up with my Rook on c1.) [10...Nbd7=] 11.Bg5 (Text cont. next col.)

(Cont. from prev. col.) (Terance: Played to provoke Black into weaken his Kingside pawns to break the annoying pin on his Knight.) [11.c5+- Bxe5 12.Bxe5]
11...h6 12.Bh4 [Strongly threatening c5.] 12...g5 [12...Qc7= keeps the balance.] 13.Bq3 b6 [D]



(Terance: Now c6 is left as a target.) [13...Nbd7+-] **14.cxd5** [14.h4+-] **14...exd5 15.Bd3** Bxe5 **16.Bxe5** [Much weaker is 16.dxe5?! Nfd7+=] **16...Nbd7** [D]



(Terance: I was glad to see this move, which was best, but I was afraid of Nfd7, and then f5. Black could have pushed his f5 Pawn down threatening to trap my Bishop. This was a high wire act ((see analysis)) I didn't want to get into but is bad for Black if White found all the right moves.) [16...Re8; 16...Nfd7 17.Bg3 f5 Stockfish 030721: 18.h4 f4 19.hxg5 fxg3 20.Rxh5 Qf7 21.Be2 gxf2+ 22.Kd2 Na6, etc...] **17.Bg3 Bg4?** (Terance: Best was Bg6 as Bg4 is too slow giving me a 2.5 pawn advantage. I guess Black wanted to get his Bishop in a better position to give his Knight the h5 square if needed.) [17...Bg6+-] **18.0-0** (Terance: I thought h3 might be slightly better as it gives the h2 square for the Bishop to which to go if attacked with Nh5. I played for quick King safety.) [White should try 18.h3+- Bh5 19.Qa4] **18...Be6** [18...Nh5+-] **19.Ne2** [D] (Next col.) (Terance: Here I was thinking of playing f4 threatening f5, trapping Black's Bishop, but I chose to target the c6 Pawn, as Black can play Ne4, if f4. I was seeing if (Text cont. next col.)

(Cont. from prev. col.) Black would play one of his Rooks to c8, so I can play Ba6! Black will have to move his Rook away from the c-file. I would win his c6 pawn, because my Bishops would control the b8, c8, b7, and c7 squares.) [19.Qd1+-] **19...c5** [Hoping for ...c4.] (Terance: I honestly forgot that Bob could play this.) 20.dxc5 Nxc5 21.Qa3 (Terance: Thank goodness for pins.) 21...Qd7? (Terance: This move gives White a decisive advantage according to the Stockfish chess engine. From a human standpoint, I understand the move was to break the pin and try to exchange Black's Bishop on f5.) [21...Nfe4+- was necessary.] **22.Bb1** [D]



(Terance: Here is a lesson in positional thinking at my level:

- 1. Immediate threat Nxd3, if allowed Qxd3 Bf5 and Black gains some squares. Option move Bishop to c2 ((blocks Rook file)) or b1. Both are playable, but I prefer Bb1.
- 2. Take stock of the whole board with my Bishop on b1 in my mind:
- A White's pawn structure is solid. King is safe with no weakness vs. Black's isolated d-Pawn and weak kingside Pawns slightly exposing Black's King. White +!
- B Black's Rooks are not on any active squares vs. White has an active Rook on a half-open file. White +! (Text cont. p.8)

(Cont. from p.7)

C – Black's Bishop is doing nothing vs. White's Bishops cutting across Black's position. White +!
D – Black's Knights are active, but only have the h5, g4, and e4 squares ((the rest pose no threat)) with no major threats vs. White's Knight going to d4 as a nice outpost. White +!

E- Both Queens are about equal.
3. Now with Bb1 Black can play Nfe4 ((not Nce4, Rc7!)). Then I can play Be5 or Rfd1. If Nxg3, then Nxg3!

4. Now the most likely move for Black is to play Bf5 trading off his bad Bishop for my more active one. So, I asked myself, "I can either let him take my Bishop on b1 after I play Nd4, but then I have to take back with Rxb1 and my Rook is out of play from the c-file; or I can play Bxf5, Qxf5 then Nd4! gaining a tempo on the Queen covering key squares in Black's camp". White ++! 5. Final decision "Bb1" is played.)

22...Bf5 [Better is 22...Nfe4 23.b4 Nxg3 24.Nxg3 Ne4] **23.Bxf5+- Qxf5 24.Nd4** [D]



24...Qd7 25.b4 (Terance: Forcing the Knight back as Black must play Ne6 to cover the c7 square from my Rook coming in.) 25...Ne6 26.Nf5 (Terance attacking the weak h-Pawn, also coordinating my pieces to control d6.) 26...h5 [Better is 26...Ng7] 27.Bd6 (Terance: Best was Be5, but I choose this sneaky move, as if Black plays Rfd8, then Be7 gains an Exchange, or the Knight on f6. If Rfc8, then Ne7 with a fork on the King and Rook. Rfb8 of course Bxb8.) 27...Rfe8 (Terance: Only move.) 28.Qd3 (Terance: In this position the chess engine gives White about a Rook's advantage, 4.97.) (Text cont. next col.)

(Cont. from prev. col.) 28...Ne4 (Terance: Bob mentioned here after the game that he thought he was gaining a piece. Believe it or not, this was the second-best move by only by a few tenths of a point from Rad1.) [28...d4 was called for. 29.Nh6+ (29.exd4 Nf4+-) 29...Kg7; Stockfish 030721: 28...Rad8 29.f3 d4 30.e4 Nh7 31.f4 gxf4 32.Bxf4 Nxf4 33.Rxf4 Kh8 34.Rh4 f6, etc...] 29.Qxd5 Nxd6 30.Qxd6 [D]



[Stockfish 030721: 30.Nxd6 Rf8 31.Rc6 Ng7 32.b5 g4 33.Qg5 Qe6 34.e4 Qg6, etc...] 30...Qb5 (Terance: Best was to trade Queens.) [Better is 30...Qxd6 31.Nxd6 Re7 Stockfish 030721: 32.Rfd1 Rd8 33.Kf1 Red7 34.Rc6 h4 35.Ke2 f5, etc...] **31.Ne7+** [Stockfish 030721: 31.Nh6+ Kg7 32.a4 Qxa4 33.Nf5+ Kh7 34.Qe5 Qxb4 35.Nd6 Ka8, etc...1 **31...Kq7?** [31...Kh7 might work better. 32.Nc6 Qf5] **32.Nd5** [Black must now prevent Qe5+.] (Terance: at this point I knew it was over as I have access to the e5 square.) 32...Rad8 [Better is 32...Qd3 33.Qe5+ Kh7 34.Nf6+ Kh6] 33.Qe5+ [D]
