J oe wrote:
"For veteran players, GM Alexander Shabalov really needs no introduction.
A student of the late world champion Mikhail Tal, he moved from Latvia to Pittsburgh in late 1992, and has generally been Pennsylvania's strongest player ever since. He's won the United States Championship four times (1993, 2000, 2003, 2007) and was inducted into the U.S. Chess Hall of Fame in 2015. I've been playing chess for decades now, and l've played all over Pennsylvania, but after years and years of trying to be paired with him (several times I missed by only one board), my wish finally came true, and I can finally add GM Shabalov to the pantheon of players that I've faced. The organizers of the Ohio Chess Congress (Ohio's state championship) asked one player on every board of the open section to keep score on an electronic device that they provided in lieu of taking score on paper. This was supposed to transmit the games live online. (Text cont. next col.)
(Cont. from prev. col.) When the game was over, they would print out a copy of the game for that player. After the game, I found out that there was a problem, and the games were not transmitted online. Shabalov was about four minutes late, so by default, I kept the score electronically, but I also kept score on a scoresheet too, because I wanted him to sign it after the game, which he did."

I did not see that particular line, but I was afraid that if I played 20.bxa5, my Pawn on a3 would be weak and Black would gang up on it.) 20...axb4

(Joe - This is a sign that White cannot do too much, although 22.Re1 is a good move (Text cont. next col.)
(Cont. from prev. col.) too. One thing that I was afraid of was I thought Black could play 22 ...Kh7 with the idea of 23...g5 24.Qh3 h4. However, in that line, White has 23.Be7! and now 23...g5? 24.Nxg5+ Qxg5 25.Qxg5 hxg5 26.Bxf6.) 22...b6 (Joe - Simply threatening 23...c5, and the Bishop must abandon the defense of a3.)

23. Rc1? (Joe - This is pretty pointless, because after Shabalov played 23...Ne4, it renewed the threat of ...c5, and now it's unstoppable.) (Joe - The computer found the very imaginative 23 .Re1. Now if 23 ...c5 24.dxc5 bxc5 25.Bc3 Ne4 26.Nh4 Nxc3 27.Qxc3. White is still worse, but he's still fighting.
