(Cont. from p.2) better than taking the Knight.) **20.Nf3** (Terance: Best move.) 20...h6 (Terance: Options, options, do I try and defend the d6 Pawn with Nb7, and lose the a4 Pawn? No, the Knight is too passive and blocks the open b-file. It is too dangerous to play Qc6 to try and hold the a4 Pawn. Ng5 gives White attacking chances. The d6 Pawn is more important than the weak Double-Pawn on a4. King safety is most important. Then comes bring my Knight back into play with Nc6 and I can pose a threat with Nb4 forking Rook and Queen. I thought playing Nh4 then to Nf5 was the strongest, but the Stockfish chess engine slightly prefers Nd4.) 22...Nc6 [Threatens to win with ... Nb4.] 23.Nxc6 [23.Nf5!= was the only way to keep the balance. [D11: Slav defense: 3 Nf3 sidelines and 3...Nf6 4 e3 Bg4] (Terance: This is a model Exchange Variation Slav for me. I will show how to play the opening with a definite plan and take advantage of any positional inaccuracies. I played this way, which is my style and tips I got (Text cont. p.4)

(Cont. from p.3) from a Grandmaster on this Slav line on YouTube. I will take you through my thought process best I can.) 1.d4 d5 2.c4 c6 (Terance: This is the 2nd time I played Preston ((result was a draw)) with White and he again plays the Slav.) 3.Nf3 Bf5 [D]



(Terance:

This is the line Preston played before and can be tricky for White. White's plan in any of these Slav variations that have the Bishop on f5 is to plan to get rid of it by way of Nh4 or Bd3 and exchange it as it is Black's most active piece being on that diagonal. Now knowing that Black will try to tuck it away by playing h6 from the Kingside Knight. Sometimes Black will play the Bishop back to g6 and allow you to take it to open his Kingside Rook. Just be aware if you take it, that you play h3 at some point later in the game, watching out for sacs on your h-Pawn, so you hope Black castles on that side. The downside of having Black's Bishop of f5 for him is that it leaves his Queenside weak, especially his b-Pawn. This really becomes apparent in the Exchange Variation of the Slav, when Black plays e6 locking the Bishop out. Watch how I take advantage of that and then remove the strong Bishop.) **4.cxd5** (Terance: This time I decided to play the Exchange Variation.) 4...cxd5 (Terance: Now Black has two weak Pawns to target. That is why the normal line suggested is Qb3 as White's next move. I had this in mind, but I know that Qb6 is played, and I was not ready to play that line yet, so I waited to see what Black would play after Nc3.) 5.Nc3 [Stockfish: 5.Qb3 Nc6 6.e4 dxe4 7.Ne5 Nxe5, etc...] **5...e6** 6.Bf4 [Stockfish: 6.Qb3 Qb6 7.Qxb6 axb6 8.Nh4 Bg6, etc...] **6...Nc6 7.e3** [7.Rc1 Bd6 8.Bxd6 Qxd6 9.e3 a6 10.Nh4 Bg6 11.Nxg6 hxg6, etc... 1/2-1/2 (13) Taborska, V (2077)-Kubikova, A (2143) Luhacovice 2003 7...a6 (Terance: This prevents Bb5 but weakens the b6 square ((keep that square in mind)).) 8.Qb3 (Terance: White is slightly better. Applying pressure on the b7 Pawn allowing Black to play a positional inaccuracy, I will have time to deal with the f5 Bishop later.) [8.Bd3 Bxd3 9.Qxd3 Bd6 10.Bxd6 Qxd6 11.0-0 Nge7 12.Rfc1 0-0, etc... Nunes, A (1670)-Auriemo, D (1611) Sao Paulo 2014 1-0] 8...Qc8?! (Terance: Not the best move in (Text cont. next col.)

(Cont. from prev. col.) which you will see why. Rb8 loses to Bxb8 but Ra7, as ugly as it may seem, is much better than Oc8.) [Black should play 8...Na5+= 9.Qa4+ Nc6] **9.Be2** (Terance: King safety first! Always finish your development before proceeding an attack.) **9...Nf6N** [9...Bb4 10.0–0 Bxc3 11.bxc3 Nge7 12.Rac1 0–0 13.c4 Qd7 14.cxd5 Nxd5 15.Bg3 Rac8, etc... Klein, J-Buitre, C Paris 1998 1–0 (40)]

10.0-0 h6?! [D]



(Terance: Too slow a move as Black needs to develop and not worry too much about his Bishop.) [10...Nh5+- is a better defense.] 11.Rfc1+- (Terance: This move shows why Qc8 was not such a good move along that it does not help contest my f4 Bishop. Now Black tries to get his King into safety.) 11...Be7? (Terance: Black needs to do something to minimize the pressure on his Queenside. Be7 does none of that, allowing my next move that's considered winning.) [11...Nh5+- keeps fighting.] 12.Na4! (Terance: According to the Stockfish chess engine White is winning with a five Pawn advantage. As a human I felt I had a nice advantage and was wondering how can Black stop Nb6!)

(Terance: Best move in my opinion to consolidate my advantage. It made no sense to allow Black to take my Bishop doubling my Pawns which are restricting Black's position.) 17...b5 (Terance: Gaining space but leaves c6 weak now that Black has given up blocking the b-file.) 18.Qd1! (Terance: Now to my second part of my plan, I removed my Queen from danger and at the same time prepare to exchange the active Bishop on f5.)

18...Qb7 19.Bd3 (Terance: Now to exchange my passive Bishop for his active one.) 19...Bxd3 20.Qxd3 Re8 (Terance: Black is trying to form a plan. The only viable plan I saw was Black getting his Knight to c4. Black does not want to trade pieces being down an Exchange, and if he tries to open the position it will be to White's favor.) 21.a3 (Terance: In hindsight, a4 was the best move to kill Black's plan to get the Knight to c4. What I played, a3, gave me a few tactical issues that ties down my Rook on a1.) [Stockfish: 21.a4 h5 22.axb5 axb5 23.h3 h4 24.Bh2 Rc8, etc... 21... Na5 22.Rc7 [D] (p.5) (Terance: I spent some time on this move as the Rook can get trapped on c6, but I worked out the precise moves to prevent that from happening to my advantage. The reason I played Rc7 was to displace Black's Queen from the c8 square, where it can't aid the Black Rook to go there. It also puts pressure on the e7 Bishop and it's on Black's second rank.) (Text cont. p.5)

(Cont. from p.4) 22...Qb6 23.b3 (Terance: Next plan, kill any plans that Black must activate his pieces and maintain control over the c-file, the lifeline in the whole position.) 23...Bf8 24.Qc2 (Terance: The most correct move and is slightly better than Qc3. I was thinking that Qc2 would allow me to bring the Rook back to c3 if I need a flight square for the Rook.) 24...f6?! 25.Rd7 (Terance: I knew I could play Qq6. I was just not too sure about the follow up moves to keep Black from taking on b3. So, I played a safe waiting move with Rd7 just in case someone played e5.) [Stockfish: 25.Qq6!? Ra8 26.Qf7+ Kh8 27.Rb1 Qb8 28.b4 Nc4, etc...] 25...e5 26.dxe5 Qe6 27.Rc7 (Terance: No better move.) **27...fxe5 28.Qc3** (Terance: Now the only thing that I was worried about was my weak back rank. I was afraid that Black my play d4 and try to open the position up and play a back rank mate. So, I kept Black busy by attacking his bad Knight on the side of the board.) 28...Qb6 [28...b4 was worth a try. 29.axb4 d4] **29.Bxe5** [Strongly threatening Bd4.White is clearly winning.] 29...b4 [D]
